### Saint of the Month

Mr. Gary Stakes has the distinction of being the eldest member of All Saints. Born on December 7, 1915 in rural Virginia, Gary and his three brothers had a grandfather who was a Baptist preacher, and their mother played the piano in church.

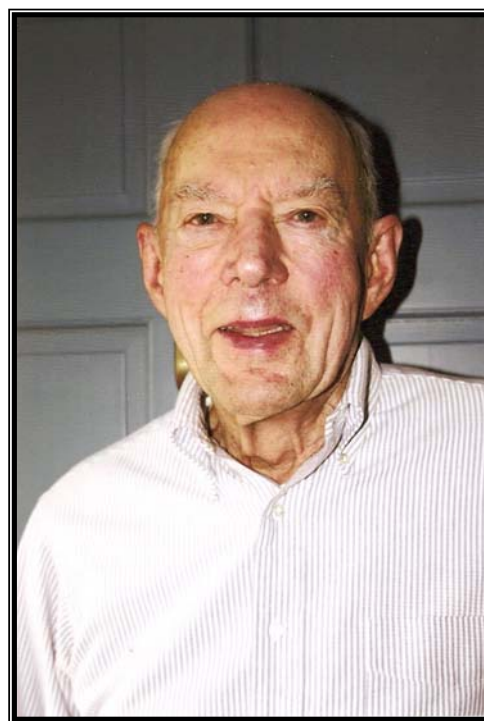
With the onset of World War I, his family moved to Washington, DC. Except for holidays in Virginia, his formative years were spent in our nation's capital. His education centered in accounting through Ford and GM schools.

As the United States became involved in World War II, Gary attended flight school. He was a navigator of a B-17. Gary and his crew flew thirty successful missions over Germany without casualties.

In 1939, Gary married Frances, the love of his life. A son, Gary Jr., was born in 1943 and daughter, Linda, completed the family in 1956.

The establishment of a Chevrolet dealership brought the Stakes clan to Morehead City in 1963. Years later, Gary became a builder and resides in one of the homes he built.

As time passed, Frankie became ill. Gary's most challenging role was caregiver until her death in 2001. Today this grandfather of three and great-grandfather of one reflects a lifetime of God's blessing. "The Lord will provide and direct you if you are open. He knows every need we have." And so He does for Gary Stakes.

### THE RECTOR'S CORNER

#### Beloved in the Lord,

It is exciting to see the Hand of the Lord over us at All Saints. Who imagined 10 years ago that there would be an Anglican Mission in America or that we would be one of the first parishes in what now numbers 151 and counting? God has given us His Word and He has been faithful to honor our obedience to Him.

When we met for dinner and reporting on the Winter Conference on February 3<sup>rd</sup>, Dave led us through a process of reflecting on three questions:

1. Where is God moving?;
2. Where is He calling All Saints to go?; and
3. What is He calling you to do?

There were some very good responses which the Vestry considered at our retreat and which we posted in the narthex the next day for all to see. A Word I had from the Lord in answer to the first question: "Where is God moving?" was, "Outside our comfort zone." And isn't that clear from our journey over the past number of years?

At our Vestry meeting on February 15<sup>th</sup> we wrestled faithfully with preparing a budget for 2010. It was decided to base our budget upon the vision we believe God has called us to, even though it is beyond the means of our pledged income. That means we will have to seek the Lord, pray, work, and expect that the One Who has called us to step in, step up and step out will lead us in accomplishing everything He has purposed. If we only plan to do what is within our own reach, we won't need to trust God for any provision, He who is God our Provider. (See Exodus 22.14)

The Long Range Planning Committee was meeting in mid-February, and in our prayer time one member received a Word from the Lord: "Chase the devil." (Storm the gates of hell.) It was clear that the way to do that is in fervent prayer, in worship, in praise, in obedience. Another committee member heard the Word: "Patience". Keeping the pace of the Lord is vital to fruit bearing. We are neither to run ahead of Him, nor lag behind Him,

but stay with Him, close to Him Who is our Shield. As I write this, I hear in my spirit: "Pursue Righteousness." What more effective way can we chase the devil than to pursue Righteousness! God's Plan is Perfect! While we may not understand many parts of His Plan, if we are obedient to that which we DO understand, other parts will become clearer and clearer. And we will see His Mighty Hand among us.

This new season we are in holds such promise of God's great goodness. I pray we will each be faithful to keep our eyes on Jesus and give grateful thanks that we are privileged to be a part of the move of His Holy Spirit, Whose voice many more are hearing and heeding. Thank you for your faithfulness. Maranatha! Come Lord Jesus!

### Credit Where Credit is Due

Maggie has a project. She has been working hard at it for many years, but it was only last November that I really realized it for what it was. I was doing a bit more polishing than usual since Thanksgiving was right around the corner and when I got to the dining room chairs I automatically went for The Furniture Stain. As I was staining away at the claw marks, I thought, this looks like a genuine piece of distressed furniture! Well, of all things, Maggie has been designing furniture... "The Distressed Design, by Maggie Marino"... I have just never given her the credit she was due for such creative work. She has been at it for years and with absolutely no appreciation from the one who loves her best.

Well, I have got to say it was a moment of clarity for me. I've come to see that it was a labor of love; her calling, if you will. Maggie does the things she knows to do in an effort to communicate with me, usually about meal times, or when she gets a little jealous for my attention, or wants to know where I am. It has changed my whole outlook about polishing the furniture. A little stain and some polish and we have got "in vogue" furniture compliments of Maggie and a better insight as to her calling.

The revelation has also caused me to reflect about other things that I might be considering with a negative slant. Perhaps I could start by looking at other people with positive thoughts about them and try to encourage them. I am not privy to the hearts of all the people in my life as to their perceived calling. However, I could give the benefit of the doubt, consider their contributions, and come to appreciate their efforts. We have many callings on our life if we are in Jesus and most likely, they will not become great headliners: "As a prisoner of the Lord then, I urge you to live worthy of the calling you received". (Eph. 4:1) "And you also are among those who are called to belong to Jesus". (Romans 1:6) "God has called us to live in peace". (I Cor.7: 15b) "And we know; that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose". (Rom.8: 28)

It may seem to us that we are merely covering up scratches and claw marks with furniture polish, but God has a plan. What is God's good plan and purpose in our calling; in all he gives us to enjoy, to learn, and to add to our life? "And we, who with unveiled faces all reflect the Lord's glory, are being transformed into His likeness with ever-increasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit". (2 Cor. 3:18) (NIV throughout)

Maggie puts her stamp on my furniture and I add the stain and polish to dress it up so it looks pretty good with some stretch of imagination, and I give her credit for her persistent efforts. God is creating something anew without stain or blemish and the credit is all His. It is He who works in us both to will and act according to His good purpose...(Phil.2: 13) God is always at work. Jesus said that His Father works and so does He. Even though we cannot see the invisible efforts on our behalf, we have God's promise that we are in the process of design and change. He has His stamp on His work also..."Child of God" and we won't need any touching up when He's finished with us.

## A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

***If I had cherished sin in my heart,  
the Lord would not have listened... (Psalm 66:18)***

**Do you harbor sin?** Are you protecting and coddling a sinful habit or pattern? I know these are invasive and personal questions. But they're ones we have to deal with.

During the Lenten season, we're reminded of the fact that our sinfulness put Jesus on the Cross – and that our sinfulness corrupts our relationships with God and the people around us. And so Lent is a good time to frequently ask God to search our hearts and minds, to show us the sin therein, and then draw us into a place of confession.

**Imagine, if you can, your prayers flowing through a tube...** from you to God.

Now, imagine that your **unconfessed sin is a huge clog** in that tube. It's a clog that inhibits the flow of sharing and hearing – it simply kills communication. We need to see that if we're holding onto - even cherishing – a sin pattern, David says God is bound by His own word not to respond to our prayer.

So, as we approach the topic of repentance and prayer during Lent, let our first order of business be to deal with unconfessed sin.

**So, I encourage you,** during this Lenten season, to— **read and meditate on Psalm 32** a passage that shows us how to “get real” with God. In it, David speaks of the heaviness and dryness that accompanies us as we cling to our sin:

*3 When I kept silent, my bones wasted away through my groaning all day long. 4 For day and night your hand was heavy upon me; my strength was sapped as in the heat of summer.*

But then, David reveals the blessing and the confident assurance that flows into our souls when we humble ourselves in His presence:

*5 Then I acknowledged my sin to you and did not cover up my iniquity. I said, "I will confess my transgressions to the LORD"-- and you forgave the guilt of my sin. 6 Therefore let everyone who is godly pray to you while you may be found; surely when the mighty waters rise, they will not reach him. 7 You are my hiding place; you will protect me from trouble and surround me with songs of deliverance.*

**Whatever your circumstance, cry out to God and confess your sins.**

He knows we sin. He knows we struggle. He knows we're human. He knows we fail, fall short, and mess up. You'll never surprise Him. He knows when our hearts are right – when we're truly committed to seeking and following Him – and that's where He pledges to meet us, bless us and restore us.



For the sixth year, All Saints Anglican Church will have a team, “All Saints Sea-King A Cure,” at the upcoming 2010 Relay for Life event to be held May 14 – 15 at West Carteret High School. For those who don't know, Relay For Life is a fund-raising event for the American Cancer Society but also a celebration of cancer survivorship and a community fair. It's also a time for fellowship with our All Saints family and with so many other Relay participants; numerous businesses, churches, school organizations, and individual groups come together with the same mission – to contribute something to the fight against cancer.

During the actual Relay booths are set up around the West Carteret football field and track selling food, beverages, crafts, etc... There is music and entertainment all night long. It is emotional, touching, inspiring, and hopeful. Our goal this year is to raise \$8,000 through corporate sponsors, fundraisers, and selling items from our booth at the Relay itself. Please join the All Saints team and show your support in the battle against cancer.

### Become a Team Member:

In order to become a team member you must register. You can do this on-line under “All Saints Church” at [www.carteretrelayforlife.com](http://www.carteretrelayforlife.com) or you can pick up a form at church. The fee to register is \$10, which covers the cost of your t-shirt. As a team member, you can stay for a little bit or spend the day and night with us. Yes, the entire night. You wouldn't believe the number of tents set up on a football field! Team members can sign up to walk during part of the Relay but it is NOT mandatory. We also need help at our booth during Relay selling our popular Rwandan coffee and hot chocolate.

### Kidswalk:

The Relay Kidswalk will take place Saturday morning from 10:00 – Noon. It is so much fun!! The Kidswalk is designed for young people up to age 15. The kidswalk opens with a lap around the track and then kids can enjoy numerous activities, games, prizes, free food, etc... The cost to register is \$5 and young people are encouraged to raise \$25 for Relay. Sign up forms are at the church.

### Corporate Sponsors:

A lot of the money that teams are able to raise for Relay comes from Corporate Sponsors. There are different levels of corporate sponsorship ranging from \$250-\$3,000. For a \$250 Bronze level, a sponsor receives recognition in print advertising, a sign at the Relay, and complimentary entry fee for 10 people from your company (valued at \$100). With higher corporate sponsorship levels, the recognition increases. For instance, with a donation of \$500 your business name can be placed on the Relay t-shirt.

Most clients can pay for their meals, some clients make a partial payment., and some clients are "granted." This organization is funded through local churches and private donations.

All Saints is active in this ministry through administration, home visits and volunteers who deliver the meals. Drivers spend approximately two hours one day a week. Substitutes are always needed. For some clients, the volunteer who delivers their lunch is the only face they see all day.
